COVID-19 Quick Hits

1. CDC [updated their testing guidance](#) to recommend priority Nucleic Acid or Antigen testing of some asymptomatic groups according to local health department recommendations.
2. On May 11, Baltimore City Health Department released a [clinician letter](#) providing greater clarity around the current pathways to provide patients COVID-19 testing.
3. CMS [stated](#) that **Medicare and Medicaid will cover COVID-19 diagnostic tests** when ordered by any health care professional. CMS will also [cover](#) certain serology (antibody) tests.
 - a. New HRSA [COVID-19 Uninsured Program Portal](#) - Providers can claim reimbursement for testing and treating uninsured individuals for COVID-19. Click [here](#) for more info.
4. On May 1, **MDH sent a clinician letter** clarifying Maryland's exclusion guidance for Healthcare Personnel (HCP) following exposure to or diagnosis with confirmed or suspected COVID-19, based on recently revised CDC guidance on HCP confirmed or suspected COVID-19 stay home from work for at least 10 days after their symptom onset.
5. CDC updated its **home isolation guidance** to recommend isolation for at least 10 days since symptom onset, even if symptoms have resolved for over 72 hours. Baltimore City Health Department has resources for clinicians about home isolation available [here](#).
6. State launches Maryland PPE Network Supplier Portal, the [Maryland Manufacturing Network Supplier Portal](#) is an online platform that helps connect Maryland suppliers with buyers in need of critical resources.
7. FDA [issued](#) an **Emergency Use Authorization for Remdesivir** administration in adults and children with severe COVID-19. The EUA follows an [NIH study](#) that shows accelerated *time to recovery* with Remdesivir treatment for severely ill patients. The study also suggests a possible *survival* benefit, but it is not currently statistically significant.

8. FDA [issued new guidance](#) requiring all commercial antibody test manufacturers seek FDA approval within 10 days of marketing their test. Almost all commercially available antibody tests have not been evaluated by FDA. It is important for Baltimore clinicians to know that they should *not* use antibody tests as diagnostic tests.
9. CRISP unveiled a new at-risk patient identifier tool called **the [COVID-19 Social Susceptibility Index](#)**. The index analyzes multiple factors to score high and severe-risk patients for proactive outreach and support. The score variable appears in the [Pre-AH Prevent Avoidable Hospital Events tool](#) in CRISP.
10. Governor Hogan extended his [executive order](#) (4/29) prohibiting utility providers from shutting off or charging late fees for residential services, including electric, water, phone, and internet through June 1.

COVID-19 & Baltimore City Social Determinants of Healthcare Spotlight

Now more than ever during COVID-19 we recognize the urgent need to connect people to social resources and streamline the coordination of stakeholders involved in this work. As we continue efforts to flatten the curve we recognize the necessity of recognizing and addressing another [surging demand curve from secondary impacts of COVID-19](#) related to social needs.

- Consider [signing up](#) for **The Connection: Baltimore’s Social Needs Newsletter**, put forth by the Baltimore City Health Department about our response to COVID-19, social determinants of health, and the work we and our partners are doing to ensure Baltimore residents get access to essential resources such as food, housing, and mental health
- **Health Disparities:** To date, Maryland’s communities of color make up a disproportionate number of [COVID-19 cases and deaths](#). Communities of color have been subject to centuries of structural racism, which has led to disparities in housing, wealth, access to healthy food, access to clean and green spaces. This has impacted the [health outcomes](#), stress levels, and [access to care](#). These circumstances have significantly contributed to the underlying health conditions communities of color are experiencing and that put them at higher risk of severe COVID-19 and COVID-19 related death. This link between social determinants and the impacts of COVID-19 underscores the importance of addressing Baltimore’s social needs in our collective response to the COVID-19 pandemic.
- **Community Resources:** Have you checked out [CHARMcare](#)? This is our resource database that contains information on available social, behavioral, and health services in Baltimore City. To ensure that anyone who visits CharmCare gets accurate, up-to-date, COVID-19, specific resources, we are working diligently to update all food resources every 48 hours, and all other resources weekly. To support our partners, and to ensure that we have a comprehensive set of resources, we are working with Baltimore’s Maryland Access Point (MAP) program and Central Maryland 211.

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PPE Request Process

1. Complete the MDH Emergency Medical Materials Request Form ([link](#))
2. Send the request form to MedResourceRequest@baltimorecity.gov
3. BCHD staff will contact you directly to discuss the specifics of your request. Please allow up to 48 hours for review and processing.
4. If BCHD is able to fulfill your request, you will be asked to designate a facility representative we can work with to coordinate pick-up of the supplies. Your delivery driver will be required to show a facility ID badge
